

CAMPUS SECURITY

University of Hawai'i Maui College (UHMC) is firmly committed to providing a safe and secure campus environment. Policies and procedures are designed to ensure that every possible precautionary measure is taken to protect persons and property. However, you need to be aware that preventive efforts on your part can effectively reduce your chances of becoming a victim. This brochure is part of our effort to promote awareness of current UHMC and community programs that are provided for your safety and well-being.

UHMC is situated on 78 acres of land including academic, administrative, recreational, and student housing facilities. In addition, outreach centers are located in Molokai, Lana'i, Hana, Lahaina and Kihei. The campus population consists of approximately 3,000 day and night credit students each semester. UHMC has a regular staff of approximately 300, including 103 faculty, and 83 part-time lecturers.

The Campus Security Office, under the administration of the Vice Chancellor for Administrative Affairs, is responsible for providing around-the-clock security service for the campus. The security office is located in the Laulima Building and provides security service 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

SERVICES PROVIDED

Campus security guards conduct vehicle and foot patrols on campus. They perform the full range of public safety services dealing with incident reports; campus investigations; medical and fire emergencies; traffic accidents; enforcement of College policies regulating the use of alcohol, drugs and weapons; and all other situations requiring campus security assistance. Campus security guards do not have police powers and are not authorized to carry firearms. However, any campus incident requiring an arrest will be referred to the Maui Police Department. Campus security utilizes the resources and expertise of other state enforcement agencies as needed. Whenever appropriate, meetings are held with these external agencies, and crime-related reports and statistics are exchanged.

ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

UHMC facilities are open to students, faculty, staff and the public during day and evening hours when classes are in session. UHMC has a curfew; the campus must be vacated and cleared on Monday through Saturday by 10:00 p.m. nightly. The campus is considered closed on Sunday. During times that the College is officially closed, buildings are locked, and access is limited to faculty, staff, and authorized students only. The general public may attend cultural and recreational events on campus, but access is limited to the facilities in which these events are held. Individuals found on campus without proper authorization when the College is officially closed are trespassing.

REPORTING OF CRIMES AND EMERGENCIES

Crimes and other emergencies on campus can be reported directly to the Campus Security Office by dialing Ext. 255 from any telephone on campus. To reach the Campus Security Office from off-campus telephones, dial 984-3255.

Students, faculty and staff are encouraged to report all suspicious activities and/or persons observed on campus to Campus Security or the Maui Police Department. A student may request that the Vice Chancellor of Administrative Affairs or the outreach site coordinator assist in making these calls. Such calls should be made promptly to improve the agency's ability to investigate the situation and to apprehend suspects and/or prevent potential crimes. Upon receipt of a call, security officers will respond to the site of the emergency. All incidents are investigated and reports are filed by the security officer. These reports are reviewed daily by the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Administrative Affairs.

At the Molokai, Lana'i, Hana, Lahaina and Kihei outreach centers, crimes and other emergencies should be reported directly to each outreach site coordinator who will in turn immediately contact the police. Their phone numbers are as follows:

Off-campus behavior, which indicates that a student represents a danger to the health and safety of other members of the UHMC community may also be subject to University disciplinary procedures. CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

The UHMC crime prevention program is based upon the dual concept of eliminating or minimizing opportunities for crime while encouraging students and employees to assume responsibility for their own safety and the safety of others by taking common sense precautions. The following is a listing of UHMC's crime prevention programs.

Night Escort Service: Campus Security provides walking escort service for anyone requesting an escort when walking on campus at night. An escort can be summoned to your location by calling Security at Ext. 255. The escort will walk you to any facility/vehicle parked on campus.

Emergency Telephones: The College has nine Emergency Telephone call boxes placed in various locations, which will direct dial campus security or 911 in the event of an emergency.

Maui Police Department Community Sub-Station: A MPD Community Sub-Station is located near the UHMC Science Building to increase police presence on campus.

SEXUAL OFFENSES

Any member of UH Maui College who commits a sexual offense is subject to criminal prosecution and university disciplinary procedures. Under University disciplinary procedures, a variety of sanctions may be imposed, including dismissal or loss of employment. By law, all University disciplinary procedures provide due-process protection for the accuser and the accused. Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding. At the conclusion of the mandated hearings related to the sexual offense, both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the decision and sanction.

Any student who is sexually assaulted should report the incident to the Sexual Assault Crisis Center (Hotline: 873-8624), Campus Security, and the Maui Police Department regardless of whether or not the student plans to press charges. A victim's physical and emotional well-being is of paramount concern. It is also important to consider preserving physical evidence to assist in apprehending and prosecuting any attacker. While forcible rape has long been recognized as a sex offense, students should be aware that acquaintance (date) rape is also a crime. Prevention is the best remedy. An informational pamphlet entitled "Stop Sexual Harassment" is available free of charge at the Office of Student Services. Service providers for victims of sexual assault are listed under the "Assistance Programs" section of this report.

CAMPUS SECURITY POLICY STATEMENT ADDRESSING SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION

In accordance to the "Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act" of 2000, which amends the Jacob Wetterling Crimes Against Children and Sexually Violent Offender Registration Act, the *Jeanne Cleary* Act, and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, the UHMC Administrative Affairs Office provides a link down below to the Hawai'i Criminal Justice Data Center where information regarding registered Sex Offenders in the State of Hawai'i can be found. This act requires institutions of higher education to issue a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement information provided by a State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a State to provide notice of each institution of higher education in that State at which the person is employed, carries a vocation, or is a student. In the State of Hawai'i convicted sex offenders must register with the Hawai'i Criminal Justice Data Center maintained by the State Attorney General's office. Chapter 846E, Hawaii Revised Statutes, mandates that the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center maintain a central repository of covered offenders in the State of Hawai'i. The following information about those persons is available to the public: name, prior names, aliases, nicknames and

pseudonyms, year of birth and alias year of births, physical description including scars and tattoos, photograph, residence, temporary and future addresses, personal vehicles(s) driven, street name of employment and volunteer location, college/university affiliation, and crime for which convicted, judgment of conviction, judgment of acquittal, or judicial determination of unfitness to proceed for which the offender is registered, and the provision of law defining the criminal offense. Reminder: Positive identification of a person believed to be a covered offender cannot be established unless the person's fingerprints are compared against the offender's fingerprints taken at the time of arrest or incarceration.

Information is updated regularly in order to assure that it is complete and accurate. However, no guarantee is made or implied. You are cautioned that it is possible that information provided on this site may not reflect the current residence, status or other information regarding an individual.

Information regarding covered offenders is permitted pursuant to Chapter 846E. Public access to this information is based solely on the fact of each offender's criminal conviction and is not based on an estimate of the offender's level of dangerousness. By allowing the public access to this information, the State makes no representation as to whether the covered offenders listed are dangerous. Any person who uses the information in this registry to injure, harass, or commit a criminal act against any person included in the registry may be subject to criminal prosecution, civil liability, or both.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

The purchase, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages is regulated by state law. Under state law, no one under the age of twenty-one may purchase, possess, or consume alcoholic beverages on campus. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is forbidden in all public and common areas. Students and employees found to be in violation may be subject to the provisions of state law, UHMC Policy, and the Student Conduct Code.

ILLEGAL DRUGS

As prohibited by state and federal law, UHMC students and employees are not permitted to be under the influence of, possess, manufacture, distribute, or sell illicit drugs at any of UHMC sponsored or approved events, on UHMC property or in buildings used by the College for its educational or recreational programs. Students and employees found to be in violation are subject to arrest. Conviction may result in probation, fines and imprisonment. Students are also subject to disciplinary action under the Student Conduct Code.

WEAPONS

The possession or use of lethal weapons on UHMC premises is strictly prohibited. Lethal weapons include but are not limited to firearms, ammunition, spear guns, explosives and dangerous substances. Any person found in violation may be subject to the provisions of state law, UHMC Policy, and the Student Conduct Code.

Note: The Criminal Property Damage category includes the offense of Vandalism. The Theft category also includes Larceny, Forgery, Fraud, Embezzlement, and Stolen Property. The "Other" category also includes Curfew, Runaway, DUI, Gambling, Family Offenses and "Other" (According to the Maui County Police Department Statistics.) Also note that all UH Maui College outreach sites are taken into consideration when tallying statistics.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

A successful campus safety program needs the cooperation, involvement and support of students and faculty. Through this report, articles in the student newsletter, and special workshops that will be offered from time to time, students and employees will be reminded to exercise caution and to actively practice crime prevention.

Criminals often act when opportunities to commit crimes present themselves. By taking precautions, such opportunities may be minimized. Exercise these simple, common sense precautions.

1. Travel/park in lighted areas; travel in pairs if possible; use the escort service/security.
2. Report any suspicious persons or activities; report all incidents no matter how minor; report losses immediately.
3. Lock/secure windows and doors in your office or room; lock your vans, cars, trucks, and bikes; store valuables in the trunk of your car.
4. Never loan keys to anyone (they are easily lost, stolen or duplicated).
5. Mark or engrave your belongings; don't leave belongings or valuables unattended.
6. Register your bike/moped.
7. Keep alert; be aware of your surroundings. Walk briskly.
8. Have keys ready when approaching your car so you will be able to get into your car quickly.

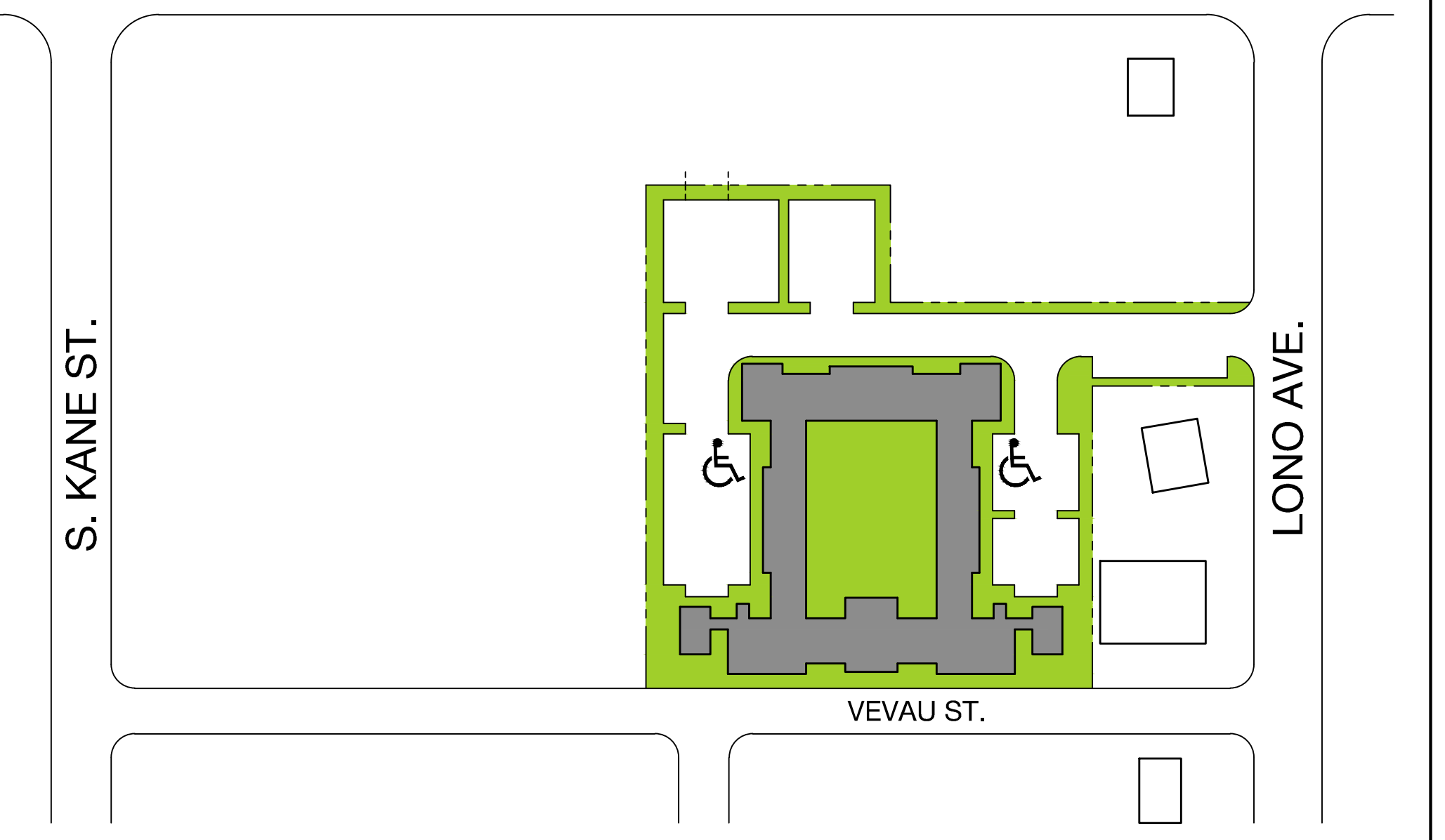
