OBJECTIVES

Our study of Hawaiian will focus on successfully demonstrating the following competencies upon completion of the second year of study:

Listening Comprehension

- 1. Understand questions and statements involving recombination of learned material.
 - 2. Comprehend the main idea of a selected passage of authentic speech.

Reading Comprehension

1. Read and understand the main idea and literal meaning of text written in nontechnical prose.

Speaking

- 1. Ask and answer questions well enough to handle most basic, uncomplicated communicative tasks.
- 2. Participate in conversation with native speakers accustomed to speaking with non-native speakers.

Writing

1. Write a cohesive series of paragraphs involving recombination of learned material.

<u>Cultural Knowledge</u>

1. Demonstrate a deeper understanding of the cultural and social context of the Hawaiian Language

COURSE POLICIES

Your attendance is required to successfully complete this course. Language acquisition comes with daily practice. It is important that we move forward as a whole 'ohana. We will often practice in pairs or small groups. Unexcused absences will make learning more difficult not only for you but also for your classmates who will be depending on you. Commit yourself to concentration during class!

Your participation is essential! Active learning is necessary! Respond with clear, loud answers when called on. When others are responding, mouth the answers silently to yourself. Above all, don't be afraid to make mistakes! Learning from your mistakes is part of the big picture. Shyness is a definite disadvantage.

It is essential that you prepare adequately for each class. If a lesson is not read and familiarized by you before class, the result will be the wasting of other students' time in class.

You are responsible for assignments and tests. If you are absent and miss turning in an assignment or miss a test, no grade/points will be awarded.

BOOKS / SUPPLIES

The text for this course is <u>Nā Kai 'Ewalu, Papa Makahiki 'Elua</u> by Kamanā and Wilson. Also required is Pukui and Elbert's <u>Hawaiian Dictionary</u>.

Other supplies you will need include a binder or folder for handouts and worksheets, looseleaf paper, two sixty-minute blank audio cassettes of medium quality, and a 3.5" double-sided, double-density computer disk. (For use on the Macintosh — not IBM)

EVALUATION

We will complete chapters 19 & 20 of <u>Nā Kai 'Ewalu</u> and chapters 1- 8 of <u>Nā Kai 'Ewalu, Papa Makahiki Elua</u> by the end of the semester.
