We are so pleased to have you join us for Excellence in Education Day 2021, a day for exploration, learning, sharing, and connecting.




Our theme is 'A'ali'i Kū Makani (Steadfast in the Face of Difficulty) and encompasses the UH Strategic Directions focuses of:

Kaua'i Community College, in partnership with the National Tropical Botanical Garden Breadfruit Institute, created a multi-year Breadfruit research farm ('Ulutopia). This farm conducts basic research in the growth and production of breadfruit. Other universities have used the farm as a

				research sample site for nutrient analysis by tissue sampling, carbon sequestration and microorganism populations. Our students learn about Breadfruit's cultural significance, assist in data collection and analysis, and conduct research on breadfruit fungal diseases, and culinary faculty and students use breadfruit for the production of value-added products. We also regularly contribute breadfruit to the Kaua'i Independent Food Bank to feed the community.

'Ulutopia: The Intersection of Hands-On, Remote, F2F, and Community Education

We would like to share examples of hands-on, experiential, culturally-connected, placed-based educational research. Kaua'i Community College, in partnership with the National Tropical Botanical Garden Breadfruit Institute, created a multi-year Breadfruit research farm ('Ulutopia). This farm conducts basic research in the growth and production of breadfruit. Other universities have used the farm as a research sample site for nutrient analysis by tissue sampling, carbon sequestration and microorganism populations. Our students learn about Breadfruit's cultural significance, assist in data collection and analysis, and conduct research on breadfruit fungal diseases, and culinary faculty and students use breadfruit for the production of value-added products. We also regularly contribute breadfruit to the Kaua'i Independent Food Bank to feed the community.

What Teaching Online 5-Week Courses Taught Me about Teaching

Condensing a 16-week course into just 5-weeks may sound intimidating, but with the right tools and guidance, it can be one of the best courses you teach!
