What is expected of our students?

- Commitment to fulfill Program requirements
- If you place into both Developmental Math (Math 18) and Developmental English (English 19), you will be required to take one of these classes during the summer – tuition will be provided by our program.

ENG 19 or MATH 18 - Grade _____
- Enroll in English and math courses during your first year of your college career
- Successfully complete at least one course that presents Hawaiian perspectives in Hawaiian culture, language, history and philosophy. (Any 100 or 200 level HAW or HWST course).
- Submit periodic progress grade reports
 - First Grade Check
 - Second Grade Check
 - Third Grade Chek
- Meet with Mu`o A`e staff at least TWICE a semester to assess progress
- Attend ONE Cultural Development Activity
- Attend TWO Cultural Development Workshops
- Complete Interdisciplinary Studies/Student Success Course(s)
